






# Health and Physical Education

The end of 2023 is nearly upon us and while the Languages KLA is already busily preparing for 2024, it also means it's Beekon time and the opportunity to reflect on the many highlights of the past twelve months!



We are so proud of our students who worked hard for Chinese and German! So much high-quality work has been submitted during 2023.

Very early in the year our students once again excelled in the EP online World Championships. Due to public holidays falling in the middle of the competition, we lost valuable competition time, meaning we ended up with fewer certificates overall. However, the twelve students who received certificates need to be mentioned and applicated:





In the Elite category we had Alex Paget (Year 9, G8), Ash Missen (Year 10, Y1) and Bailey Paget (Year 10, G7). These students scored over 10,000 points each. This is a phenomenal achievement evidencing many hours of learning and completing vocabulary tasks. This is the first year we have had three of these and this award places the students in the top 1-2% of competitors world-wide. Furthermore, these students are not currently able to take Language classes and so did this all in their own time. Wow!

In the Gold category, scoring over 3,000 points we had Dean Muys-Gold (Year 8, Y8) while on Silver Amina Shah (Year 8, B4) and Mali Monis (Year 7, B7) scored over 2,000 points each.

Finally, in the Bronze category with over 1,000 points we had Charlotte van Praag (Year 7, Y3), Marllon Musliman (Year 7, Y9) and Sarah Nimbs (Year 7, G9) as well as Messi Lal Ram Lian (Year 8, Y4), Shayla Jordan (Year 7, B2), and Vincent Kim (Year 8, B5) who received Credit awards worth 500 points. Congratulations again to one and all.

We also ran another highly successful excursion to the city for our end of term excursion celebrating German and Chinese culture. Students loved the day out as much as the food and we are so proud of our students who behaved like the ambassadors for their school they were.

If 2023 is anything to go by then 2024 should be another great year.

This was the first year, of all Year 9 Science subjects, being semester-based electives (paired with the compulsory Core Science) and with that came the new subject of Sustainability, Forensic Science moved down from Year 10 into Year 9, joining the Innovate Science elective.

Our students also had the opportunity to experience science in action. The Year 12 Psychology students were able to use operant conditioning to train a special visitor; Sasha (Ms Coghlan's dog). The Year 11 Biology students did animal studies training at Yarra Ranges Tech School and attended the Animal Research Education and Awareness (AREA) Program at the ANZLAA Conference. They also went to Melbourne Zoo to learn more about animal adaptations and to collect data.

Turtle Club continued to demonstrate its popularity, with many students wanting to volunteer their lunchtime each Wednesday to assist Sheldon and Franklin (our resident turtles). We also acquired Strong Stick Insects (Anchiale briareus) in addition to the Spiny Leaf stick insects (Extatosoma tiaratum).


# The Pseudonyon Group





We would like to thank College Council President Mrs Julie Medlin, Acting Principal Ms Rachael Williams and all our staff volunteers for their attendance and support on the night.


